We are looking for candidates that can meet requirements listed on RFP, and we encourage each one of them to illustrate their area of expertise. Under this new RFP, new exams will be administrated to qualify.
		At a minimum, the candidate will need to have passed the following exams within the past three years, or the re-certification exams:
		- foundation level
		- energy advisor's exam
		- quality assurance specialist exam and
		- the quality assurance audit exam provided after Nov 2020.
		- To be able to bid for MURB services, the candidate will also need to pass the MURB exam.

4	The volume of work from NRCan have been in a significant decline in the past few years with no contracts in 2023. 5	I currently work full time and am wondering if you can give me a sense of what the work load/ time commitment is expected to be with this contract. I am wondering if this is something that can be worked on for 5-10 hours a week, for example, or if it would be expected to be more like 10-20 hours a week, or more. 7	During a QA Level 6 (On-site Audit in the presence of the ERC), we do not appear to have any indication of the number of hours allocated for this audit.  So, could you elaborate.  a) What are the hours required for QA Level 6?	For an On-site Evaluation (Level 6) baseline ERS assessment, the estimated time for completion of the onsite portion of a single family home is 1.5 hours to 2.5 hours, and 1.5 hours to 2 hours for the modeling portion. An additional 25% is estimated for a MURB full building.

b) In addition, is there reimbursement for travel and accommodation expenses incurred by the travel of an ERC to conduct a QA Level 6?

We will be working with available QAAs in the area to perform task/activities.
